RESPONSE TO CHALLENGES

In February, an American Republican politician, Valentina Gomez, used a blowtorch to burn books, including *Naked*. In an article written by the Montreal Gazette, Québec solidaire MNA Sol Zanetti said the book-burning was "an attack on freedom of opinion, freedom of expression and free movement of ideas, but it is also an assault on the freedom of children who will be kept away from knowledge important for their development. This is abuse of children who will be kept ignorant, with all the consequences that can have."

Mathieu Lacombe, Quebec's culture minister, compared the incident to something "an old priest from the 1900s" might have done. (https://montrealgazette.com/news/local-news/national-assembly-denounces-torching-of-quebec-authored-sex-ed-book-in-u-s)

"If [books with LGBTQ+] content [are] banned and suppressed [kids] will think something is wrong," said Jason Foster, a transgender male who spoke out about the Brandon School Division's proposal to remove books on sexuality and gender identity. "Children will hate themselves ... Children are going to die because they believe their existence is wrong." *A NOTE ON AGE RANGES
