RESPONSE TO CHALLENGES

Thief River Falls, MN - Kaffir Boy is a memoir of growing up in apartheid-era South Africa and the racial brutality of that time. Class discussion of literature like *Kaffir Boy* gives students an opportunity to learn about and discuss disturbing but significant historical events. Precluding students from reading material with difficult themes and language would deprive them of exposure both to historical works and vast amounts of important literature, including Shakespeare, major religious texts such as the Bible, the works of Flaubert, Joyce, Faulkner, contemporary books such as *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*, *Beloved*, and many of the texts regularly assigned in high schools throughout the State of Minnesota. The school district would potentially put its students at an educational disadvantage in college if it did not introduce them to challenging literature of this sort in high school.
